Texas Hold 'em, Omaha & Seven Card Stud Poker

Texas Hold 'em

If you're the player with the best five-card poker hand out of a total of seven cards dealt, you are the winner. But here's the twist:

Blind bets must be posted before any cards are dealt. Each player then receives two cards face-down. The five remaining cards are dealt face-up and are community cards shared by all players. There is a round of betting after the initial two cards are dealt to each player, and again after the flop, turn and river cards are dealt.

The first three community cards are the flop. The fourth community card is the turn. The fifth community card is the river.

During each round, players who do not wish to continue in the game may fold. Of the remaining players after the final round of betting, the one with best five-card poker hand is declared the winner.

Omaha

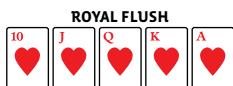
In this variant of poker, each player is dealt four cards and must make the best five-card poker hand. Each player attempts to achieve the best five-card poker hand by using exactly two of the four cards dealt to them and three of the five community cards.

As in Hold 'em, blind bets are posted before any cards are dealt. Each player then receives four cards face down. The five community cards are dealt face-up.

Seven Card Stud

Another poker variant is Seven Card Stud. In Seven Card Stud, each player receives two cards face-down and one card face-up. After the first round of betting, three additional cards are dealt face-up and one card face-down with a round of betting after each card.

To win, you must be the player with the best five-card poker hand from a total of seven cards dealt.
